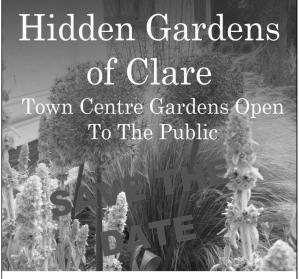

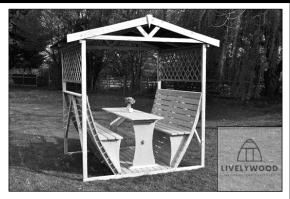

HUNDON RELIEF IN NEED

Parishioners are invited to apply, at any time, for grants from the Hundon Relief in Need Fund. These may be for individuals who reside in Hundon or Hundon organisations. The sub-committee of the Trustees consults on a regular basis, enabling applications for smaller requests to be discussed quickly. Larger grants, requiring a full meeting of the Trustees, are discussed twice a year (generally March and November).

Grants can be made for such things as

- the supply of tools or equipment to aid or improve employment potential
- the provision of funds for developing leisure or educational skills
- extending opportunities or resources for local organisations
- the provision of facilities for the physically or mentally disabled
- payments to assist in the meeting of utility bills (in extreme cases)
- payments to relieve sickness or infirmity
- help in paying travelling expenses for those attending hospital as out-patients or those visiting in-patients
- providing help for those who are carers
- providing grants for anyone affected by the pandemic

This is not an exhaustive list – we consider all types of requests! However, we are not allowed to give grants for anything which should be paid for by the state (such as various benefits).

Please apply in writing, giving as much detail as possible. Please explain who the grant is for, how much you are requesting, why you are requesting it, how or what the grant will be used for etc. Please note we will need receipts for any equipment you may buy or any services you employ.

HUNDON VILLAGE SHOP AND POST OFFICE

From Monday 19th July the wearing of face masks in public places ceased to be mandatory in law and became a matter of personal choice. The government's guidance however states that they expect people to continue to wear a mask in crowded or enclosed spaces where they are in contact with people that they don't usually meet. We are therefore, in line with almost all other retailers and organisations, asking that, where they are able to, people continue to wear a mask when using the shop.

Restrictions on social distancing have also been removed but the government guidance still says that we should continue to distance ourselves from those that we do not live with. At the shop we will continue to limit the numbers of customers in the shop but have increased the number to three customers at any one time. COMMUNICATION WITH HUNDON RESIDENTS – WEST SUFFOLK PLAN - JULY 2021

On behalf of Hundon Parish Council

West Suffolk Local Plan Consultation

Proposal for a Hundon Parish 'Housing Needs Survey'

As you will be aware, past and recent Hundon Heralds have published information about the West Suffolk Strategic Planning process and last month we included a map and list of "Potential Sites Offered for Housing Development – May 2021".

This showed all the sites currently offered up by the present landowners for consideration. There is the potential for this planning process to expand the present level of housing in Hundon (which is currently around 470 homes) to meet the growing and changing need for homes in the village and across the county.

It is the Parish Council's (PC) opinion that it is better to provide our own evidence and views for the expansion of the village rather than just accept any that are proposed by developers. Many of you have already made your views known on the council planning website and this is always a good way of communicating with the County Council.

In the last Herald article the PC advised that they would be establishing a "Hundon Parish Local Plan Working Group" to establish the needs and requirements of residents over the coming years, and the advantages/disadvantages to any development that is to be implemented in the village.

The working Group has now been established (Doug Nimmons, Chris Callow, Richard Edwards, Ken Button, Sharon Mott, Karen Snow) and consistent with the notice in the Herald, is looking to establish our individual needs and concerns to inform planning for our village.

To this end, during August the Working Group will issue a confidential questionnaire to all properties in the parish that will seek to understand your current household circumstances, and any anticipated housing needs and requirements for the future. We will also gather views on associated issues regarding any potential expansion of the village.

The Working Group can then collate your responses for the PC in the first instance and to West Suffolk as part of the next consultation phase in January to March 2022.

When the survey questionnaire comes through your door, please consider it carefully and provide responses so that the PC can go forward with a mandate that reflects the requirements and views of Hundon residents.

Land North of Mill Road site

One of the sites offered for development is the land North of Mill Road (Site No: 115 on the West Suffolk Website):

There is now also a "Concept Plan" for some development on part of this site (approximately 48 houses) on the Website submitted by Pigeon the development company on behalf of the landowner.

This can be seen on the West Suffolk web-site link below and a diagram from that concept plan is provided at the end of this article as an overview:

Important Note: This concept plan is <u>not</u> a planning application and does not indicate/confer any greater likelihood of this site being allocated for housing than any others until the West Suffolk Plan process is completed which will still take a number of years. There are no similar concept plans or information about any of the other sites at this time.

The developers asked to meet the Parish Council and Working group to discuss this potential concept plan and this took place on the 14th July. A number of questions were raised by the Parish Council for discussion and these are listed below.

Information sharing, discussion and engagement with Parish Councils and residents by developers is good practice and further information and events will be organised by the Parish Council as news on <u>any</u> of the sites becomes available.

Note of meeting with Pigeon Investment Management Ltd - 14 July 2021 regarding the Concept Plan for 'Land North of Mill Road SHELAA Ref: WS115'

Present: Councillors Nimmons, Spooner, Edwards, Carpenter, Callow, Hewitt, Parish Clerk: Amanda Parrett, Working Group Member: Ken Button. Pigeon Investment – Andrew Fillmore, Claire Norris

Notes of discussions:

Questions regarding the proposed mix of housing on the development:

What 'mix' of housing is proposed (ie 1 bed, 2 bed, 3 bed, bungalows/detached/semi/ terrace, flats etc)/

Is this based on consideration of the existing housing provision within the Parish and other housing needs forecasts?

What is the proposed ratio of market value houses to 'affordable' properties – and what will the 'affordable' housing comprise (ie 1/2 bedroom houses/flats etc)?

Is there any potential for including or adding sheltered/ supported housing provision? (Ageing demographic of residents is a concern currently)

Response and discussion:

Pigeon confirmed that the proposal is only at very outline concept stage and proposes around 48 homes but no

detailed work had yet been carried out on the mix of housing. They would be open to suggestions on this regarding the needs of the Parish so that these could be considered at the next stage of consideration. If the site does get approval in due course it would be also be influenced by West Suffolk Planners to consider the wider needs of the county for affordable/social/rented housing. Current planning policies would require 30% of properties on a development of this scale to be affordable. They were also open to suggestions for sheltered/supported housing provision but would need to consider partnering with a Housing Association to deliver that.

Questions regarding the proposed 'Self Build' plots:

What is the imperative/market for self-build plots? These can take longer to be built out and there is potential for disruption over an extended period to other residents in Mill Road and on the new development due to the single entrance to the site via Hall Rd.

How many self-build plots are proposed and what size of properties will the plots accommodate? Why are the self-build plots all located at the SW end of the site?

Response and discussion:

Pigeon confirmed that these take account of potential demand for self-build plots registered with West Suffolk Council and these may be both self-build by plot buyers and 'custom build' by Pigeon themselves to the specification of buyers. In either case utility and other groundworks would be prepared during the initial site development to reduce disruption at later stages. They also envisage that homes on these plots could be limited to certain size/height/design parameters to blend with the surrounds. Again — no specific numbers of plots have been allocated at this stage and their position on the concept plan is open for further consideration with the Parish and West Suffolk Council.

Questions regarding the proposed 'Economic/ Community' use plot shown on plan:

Why is this located in this position? Can it be moved to another position (for example to the far end to replace some self-build plots) to reduce impact on amenities for existing residents of Hall Rd and Mill Rd.

If no buyer for economic/community use is identified can it remain 'green space' to reduce impact on amenity for residents of Hall Rd, Seabrook, Mill Rd?

Response and discussion:

Pigeon confirmed that this space was reserved following previous discussions about possible uses for the village such as overflow car parking for the village hall and playing fields, economic/ employment units, or venues for community sports activity, or groups such as Hundon Hedgehogs etc. Its position was initially suggested to provide easy access to the village centre but Pigeon are prepared to consider other locations and suggestions from the Parish.

Questions regarding the Planning Policy Context

This mentions "Should the council therefore look to develop a larger area than the Concept Plan extent, then this would be supported by the Landowners and Pigeon".

What other 'concept planning' has been completed for any larger area of development on this site? Residents are concerned at the potential for larger scale development which will damage the existing fabric and character of the village.

Response and discussion:

Pigeon confirmed that no other concept planning has been carried out for any larger scale development, or with any of the other landowners that have offered sites.

Questions regarding the general layout of the development on the Concept Plan

What opportunities are there to vary the layout to reduce impact on the amenities of existing residents of Mill Rd, Seabrook and Hall Rd? For example by having only 'green space' to the south of the new development access road?

What constraints are there on moving/extending the site further north or along Hall Road to reduce impact on existing residents or to enable the additional inclusion of sites for sheltered/ supported housing schemes?

Response and discussion:

Pigeon confirmed that they are open to suggestions from the Parish for varying the layout, positioning and for additional strategic landscaping to reduce the impacts. They are also open to considering sheltered/supported housing as discussed previously and would like suggestions for that. It was recognised that constraints on the site may be imposed by West Suffolk Planning Policy in due course but all options can be considered at this early stage.

Questions regarding road access to the development What are the options for access at Whitings Hill end of the development to avoid additional traffic from the development using Mill Road to travel to/from Haverhill direction?

Response and discussion:

Pigeon confirmed that they had not shown access at that end due to the narrow width of Whitings Hill but would be open to reconsidering this. The PC also highlighted the need for potential improvements to Whitings Hill to cater for additional traffic and Pigeon would be prepared to discuss this with West Suffolk and Highways in due course to see what may be possible.

Questions regarding roads generally

Page 4 mentions 'highways improvements for the local areas' – what are these? Have there been any discussions with West Suffolk regarding improvements to Mill Road/ Whitings Hill/Valley Wash or other roads which will be impacted by extra traffic flows? This is major concern for residents and the Parish Council due to narrow lanes and limited visibility at tight bends etc.

Response and discussion:

Pigeon confirmed that they have included traffic calming measures at the top of Upper North Street/Hall Road in the concept plan in response to previous discussions about traffic speed at that site. They have not yet had discussions with West Suffolk or Highways about other road issues but would be open to considering these and assisting the Parish to influence other road improvements where possible.

Questions regarding increased risks of flooding/ sewage problems:

The paper mentions "Comprehensive set of technical studies" etc - what studies are these? What technical studies have been carried out to demonstrate that sustainable solutions have been found to the potential for the development increasing the risk of flooding/ sewerage problems in Lower Road/Valley Wash. This has caused problems for many years and is a major concern for residents and the Parish Council.

Response and discussion:

Pigeon confirmed that the outline proposals for surface water drainage using an 'attenuation basin' (natural pond) at the lowest part of the site is a common and accepted method of controlling surface water flows. These proposals would be subject to further technical development and they would be happy to explain these in more detail to the Parish. These specifications would be subject to scrutiny by West Suffolk in due course should this site be allocated. The sewerage problems will require further consideration and information from the Parish Council will assist with this in due course.

Further Actions:

Pigeon requested more views from the Parish on the various issues discussed above and the Parish Council have already planned to include general questions regarding these issues in the proposed **Housing Needs**

Survey planned for August 2021.

Pigeon agreed to provide more information/specifications for the proposed sustainable surface water drainage controls to address concerns over increased flooding.

What is mental health?

We ALL have mental health and, just like physical health, it needs looking after.

Mental health is:

"...the emotional and spiritual resilience which allows us to enjoy life and survive pain, disappointment and sadness. It is a positive sense of well-being and an underlying belief in our own, and others' dignity and worth"

Without mental health there is no health. One in four of us will experience a mental health issue in any given year.

<u>Tips to reduce tension in the body if you</u> <u>spend a lot of your day at a desk:</u>

- Get up and walk around periodically to get your circulation going and to change the muscles your spine is using.
- Raise your feet on something so that your thighs are parallel to the floor so that you can maintain good posture.
- To keep shoulders relaxed, have your elbows bent at 90 degrees with the desk height set so you can rest your forearms down.
- Have the top edge of your screen at eye level to avoid tension in the neck.
- Take regular breaks from the screen to allow your eyes to rest – look away into the distance for a few minutes every 20 minutes.
- Gentle seated spinal twists ease out & soften the muscles in your back
- Rotate ankles & wrists to keep circulation flowing
- Go for a walk outside in the fresh air on your break

Meditation - A brief Beginner's Guide

The essence of meditation is being present in the moment and letting go of thoughts.

Your mind thinks – you can't stop that from happening! Meditation teaches you to detach from your thoughts and become an observer of them, not to eradicate them. To begin a practice of meditation, firstly choose a regular time of day to set aside just five to ten minutes of quiet time when you won't be disturbed.

First thing in the morning is a good time, before the hustle and bustle of the day begins, you might like to just set your alarm 10 minutes earlier than usual.

- Sit up in bed stay lying down and the chances are, you'll fall back to sleep!
- Make yourself comfortable in an upright seated position and rest your hands in your lap, relaxing the shoulders.
- Firstly, just take a few moments to connect in with your breath – observe the breath and how it affects the movement of your ribcage, notice the soft expansion and release, feel the light touch of the air passing by your nostrils.... and then begin to use Pranayama – breath control.
- Breathing through your nose, count your inhale to four, take a slight pause at the top of the inhale and slowly release the exhale to the count of four, take a slight pause at the end of the exhale and repeat this process. An effective visualisation is to imagine a square:

Inhaling up the right side of the square – pause –

exhale along the top of the square – pause -

inhale down the left side of the square – pause

exhale along the bottom of the square – pause

...and continue in this way for a few more rounds. If your mind starts to wander, come back to the square and counting the breath.

Bringing focus to your mind and body, even just for a short time in this way, will help you to start the day well. It will begin over time, to train your mind away from that instant churning of the cogs when you awaken, the breath control energises the body and you will have a calmer and more peaceful approach to the new day ahead of you

One of the joys of summer is the explosion of green everywhere, even in cities. Dark green pine trees, soft green grass for picnics, tender green leaves that get darker through the summer.

Next time you are out and about as a family, see how many different green things you can count, and maybe even collect a few things to take home and press inside a heavy book. Pressed leaves and flowers can make beautiful pictures. You can even use them to create homemade cards for birthdays and other celebrations.

Summer is a wonderful time for planting too. Try planting seeds or bulbs with your child to see how they can grow when they are fed and watered. Amaryllis bulbs grow fast and have beautiful big flowers, which children will love. If you want to grow something to eat, why not try rocket, which can be harvested as soon as four weeks after planting?

Your local church will probably feature a lot of green fabric over the summer. During this time, Christians just get on with growing in our life with God, like the plants are doing. And like the plants, to grow, we need feeding spiritually. Praying is a great way to feed our growing faith.

Long summer days and nights can be a good time for prayers. Father God, sometimes I am scared.

Sometimes I am worried.

Sometimes I need help.

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FROM A RESIDENT:

A LITTLE MESSAGE FOR HUNDON DOG OWNERS

A friend shared this with me and I thought it is relevant to many Hundon villagers

"Hello everyone,

We just wanted to warn fellow dog owners in our locality about a nasty parasite our puppy recently 'picked up' which resulted in a stay at the vets, lots of medication and on-going recuperation due to weight loss.

The parasite is called Giardia and we are advised it is rare, so isn't covered by typical worming treatments. The symptoms include diarrhoea, loss of appetite and vomiting and can be deadly if not treated, particularly in young animals.

It is picked up from poo primarily, which doesn't have to be consumed as simply sniffing and licking can be sufficient to ingest the microscopic 'hosts'. These embed themselves in the intestines where they lay eggs, exacerbating the symptoms and providing a means for passing the parasite on, as well as reinfection.

It isn't limited to dogs as cats, pigs, cows, birds and humans can catch it too.

We wanted to share this information so other dog owners are aware, not least because there are still uncollected dog poos around the village footpaths, Village Hall playing field, pavements and allotments and this simply shouldn't be the case. We've been informed by the vet that, even if you collect the poo, the 'hosts' of this parasite can live on the grass / soil for quite a while, especially if the conditions are damp and wet.

We quarantined our puppy once he was allowed to come home to protect others, and disinfected all locations he used within our garden to avoid reinfection.

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START LEARNING BRIDGE FOR FREE

A local bridge club is offering people the chance to start learning the card game for free this autumn - as a result of money it made during the pandemic.

Stansfield bridge club earned thousands of pounds by running online games up to three times a week throughout lockdown.

"Bridge played online, as opposed to in village halls pre-pandemic, offered so many people a lifeline during the past year. We often had 80 or more people from all over Suffolk playing during an afternoon or evening - and even had one regular who lives in Nova Scotia.

"The club now wants to plough back some funds to enable more local people to have the chance to learn what is a fantastic card game. And what better way is there than offering a free introductory course.

"People need have no previous experience of the game. We can teach people aged 7 to 70 even if they have never picked up a pack of cards before.

"Two excellent teachers will be running the lessons in Stansfield village hall - and there will be tea, coffee and delicious home made cakes as well.

"So many people have said to me they have always wanted to learn bridge - well, here is their chance."

If newcomers enjoy the introductory course, they will be offered the opportunity to continue learning and pay a cut rate price per lesson.

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SELF HELP

I have been asked to write about my too close for comfort incident when a cricket ball hit my eyebrow, and to list any self-help methods used or others:

- 1. Firstly I was handed, within two minutes, a frozen ice block and a bag of ice cubes (well done and thank you Hundon Cricket Club) both excellent to minimise swelling and pain. But remember let go every so often so that no parts of the anatomy become frost bitten!
- 2. I did start walking home escorted but quickly realised I was shaky/wobbly so asked for a lift, quickly given, by car. Listen to your body!
- 3. Then arnica cream applied and homeopathic arnica pillules sucked, both as per instructions on the packets. I always have them in and don't hesitate to use them. The cream on the site of any bruise and pills sucked for shock and any larger wound. Listen to your body and be sensible. Some chemists, but not all, stock both these products.
- 4. Drink copious amounts of water your body needs it after any trauma - and take some before your body is desperate for it.
- 5. I am still careful to listen to my body telling me I am becoming tired so sit and rest, be it am, pm or after only a little exercise or effort.

So far as I know there is no long term damage and my stamina is improving slowly. My eyes have been fully tested an x rayed with no damage noted. The bruising was visually spectacular but very little visual external evidence now remains. The one eyed panda effect is now history, or maybe I have just become used to it.

I have had some lapses in memory and certainly do not have total recall of a few days before the incident and soon after and difficulty in recognising even friends' voices and faces, particularly complete with masks. Apologies to those and thanks to others who helped. Also thanks to 111 service, A & E on the Friday, two and a half hours to clear that and x-ray department, nearly a time record, also Eye clinic on Weds. 21st July, all at West Suffolk.
