

HUNDON W.I. A Great Bake

Ian Cumming visited Hundon WI to tell us of his journey from being a semi-finalist of the Young Wildlife Photographer of the Year competition in 1989, to becoming a finalist In the Great British Bake off 2015. What a journey it has been!

His love of photography started when at aged fourteen he spent a year in Chile, Ecuador, and the Galapagos islands, one of the photos taken during the trip, a seal & pup won him his place in the Young Wildlife Photographer competition. This was to become the start of an accomplished career.



He continued to have the opportunity to travel and take photos, this time Jamaica & the Caribbean where he took one of his most iconic photos on a beach in Antigua. Then in 1995 he went to India, the Himalayas and Tibet, where he met & photographed the Dalai Lama. This in turn lead him to becoming the Dalai Lama's photographer whenever he was in London which was a huge honour. With his love of photography and travel he combined the two and became a travel photographer, working for travel companies, travel magazines, and much more.

Skipping forward to 2014, having moved from a town to a small village in Cambridgeshire he found himself baking bread, and watching GBBO. His wife convinced him to enter the 2015 competition. 23,000 applied that year and after a rigorous audition and elimination process lan got through as one of the contestants!



During the process he had been asked what his ethos was, he had said "taking risks" and he certainly took some of those during the competition. He did not just make a cake; some weeks he engineered bakes quite literally!

He confesses that he is not an articulate or fancy cake maker, so he relied on his ingenuity and energy which obviously paid off as he was named Star Baker in weeks 2, 3 and 4. Week 1 however was not so good when Paul Hollywood likened one of his bakes to "like chewing wallpaper paste". One of his more interesting bakes was during Pastry week when he made a Roadkill Pie. Chocolate week saw him engineer a working well made entirely of chocolate which 7yrs later he still has!! Sadly, he did not win the competition, but he certainly is a Star Baker! The Sticky Toffee Cake he brought along with him for us to try was delicious.

These days he confesses his life is more of a juggle between a young family, an old house, photography and of course baking, but his energy and enthusiasm means that he is always ready for the next adventure watch this space!

THE RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS: "REMEMBER, REMEMBER..." – NOVEMBER 2022

Dear Friends,

"Remember, remember the 5th of November, gunpowder, treason and plot..." runs the old rhyme, but of course this is a relatively late tradition. In 1605 Guy Fawkes together with accomplices were discovered trying to blow up King James I in the Houses of Parliament. Their subsequent trial and execution is remembered each year in our Bonfire Night, though whether many today look beyond the fireworks and sparklers to the darker roots I very much doubt, but it has become a well-established tradition.

So it's worth having a think about what we value as traditions and why. In my youth, I would happily have swept away all "old fashioned" traditions in the name of "modernity" – but many years later, and having been ordained 9 years ago, I find I have more than a little sympathy with those who love a well-turned phrase from the King James Bible or that the "rhythm" of the old Book of Common Prayer that has nurtured them for a lifetime and which still hits a spot that modern liturgy doesn't always quite manage.

But there are two things that I must say. The first is that we, as Christians, must never find ourselves rooted to the spot. God is a God who calls us onwards to "what we might become" – and too many of us, myself included at times, find it easy to settle into a comfortable rut. The question must always be: "what has the life in Christ taught me, and how have I grown in it?" If we and our churches find ourselves in the same place, always doing the same things, then perhaps it is because we might need some new challenges.

And second, let's not forget how radical the Book of Common Prayer was: originally it was desperately unpopular, and people longed for a return to the old Latin Mass! Neither was it the greatest word in liturgy: no proper structure of the Ministry of the Word, no formal prayer of Consecration. Indeed, one of the criticisms that may be laid at its door is that it <u>omits</u> the sharing of the Peace. Former rites included it, and Cranmer's liturgy does tend towards a rather "private" version of the Eucharist that was rather foreign to the Church of the time, indeed until 1965 it was technically unlawful to sing hymns at a Prayer Book Communion!

Hymns as we know have always changed, I often find it amusing when speaking to families about funerals and they suggest a particular hymn and I ask them what tune they would like - to which they often respond, "oh the usual one", which inevitably leads me to run through at least 3 or 4 different tunes until we find what their "usual one is". The words to hymns also change, take the hymn "Praise My Soul the King of Heaven" which had the lines "Saints triumphant bow before him" in older versions but has long since become "Sun and Moon bow down before him…" I will readily admit that not all change is always good change, one hymn book I know has changed "Onward Christian Soldiers marching as to war" to "Onward Christian Pilgrims, Christ will be our light", and whilst I appreciate the anti-war sentiment, it still jars a little when I sing it. But many newer hymns and tunes are more than worth embracing.

Tradition is important: in fact, it is one of the three pillars of the Anglican Church – "Scripture, Tradition and Reason." That doesn't excuse us from change of course – and the challenge of the time is one of how to transmit our values and faith to the next generation. In that task each of us has to be fully engaged – in fact, in Christian terms it is our duty

Are you worried about heat loss and winter bills in your home?

Residents on low income, low energy efficient homes, concerned about the impact of energy bills this winter, are being encouraged to see if they qualify for free help.

Households with low energy performance ratings and whose household income is less than £30,000 may qualify for the work which includes improving insulation so that residents don't need to use their heating as often or for as long to stay warm.

The work, which is subject to Government criteria, is being targeted at people who own their home or are paying a mortgage. Tenants who are in a private rented home can also gualify but their landlord would need to pay for part of the work. Housing association tenants should contact their landlord to see if they qualify for improvements.

The scheme aims to improve the energy efficiency of homes that have a low Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating of D to G. Residents can check their EPC rating at GOV.UK - Find an energy certificate - the website contains useful information for all households on steps they can take to improve the energy efficiency of their home. If your property doesn't have an EPC, one will be carried out as part of the scheme.

After registering, you will be contacted to arrange a site visit from a council officer to discuss the work that will be most beneficial to their home.

The money for the scheme has been awarded by the Government's Department for Business, Energy, and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) and is subject to Government criteria.

HUNDON WINE CLUB

So many things have taken place at Hundon Wine Club in October.

Firstly we had a presentation from George Unwin from Baythorne Hall where he displayed some interesting wines from his cellar. There was a Sauvignon Blanc/Gros Manseng blend, a much underrated grape generally used in Bordeaux and South Western France, this example from Gascony. He followed this with a white Rioja and then a surprise wine; a wine from Georgia. This country which has a very old wine-making tradition and has recently become resurgent in producing excellent wines. On then to the reds from Portugal, Rousillon and South Africa. I am unable to comment on the wines that were tasted since I succumbed to a bout of Covid and couldn't attend.

However, I recovered sufficiently to take part in our next activity. Following on from the visit of Nick, the proprietor of Cooper's Croft vineyard in Wickhambrook, we were invited to with this year's harvest. So on Wednesday 5th October several members of our club helped Nick and co. bring in the white grapes, then on Sunday 9th October we harvested the red grapes. A very good time was had by all, and an unusual experience for us all. The weather and setting was fabulous too, so nice to "get back to nature", breathe some fragrant air and achieve a great result; 1 tonne picked each day. In addition, we were treated to a coffee break with delicious homemade cakes, and a lovely al fresco lunch with samples of last year's vintage.

Our third activity of the month was on 13th October when some doughty members of HWC plus one member from our Eastern Scotland branch made our way to Rüdesheim in the Rheingau where we settled into a comfortable, traditional, German hotel from where we had a marvellous 4-day sojourn in this ancient wine-producing town.

We managed to fit in plenty of tastings of the wonderful Rieslings, Spätburgunders and Dornfelders that are grown in the area. We started at what was to become our nightly aperitif spot; a wine booth in the town square (how's that for civilisation?).

Our visits were both modern and ancient. The first was a display of over 250 different wines where you put a token in the slot of a high-tec dispensing cabinet and a measure of the nectar sloshed into your glass! As a total contrast we visited Schlöss Johannisberg which is one of the oldest wineries in Europe, wine having been produced here since the 10th Century. We had a tour of the winery, and a tasting of several wines in the barrel-filled, yeasty-walled, darkened, deep, old cellars which was an ideal place to try these high quality wines. It also has a wine library containing examples dating back centuries.

Of course many local food delicacies were consumed-Schnitzel, Rahmgeschnezelters, Beinenstich and Schwärtzwalderkirschentorten to name a few. Love those compound long words! Another speciality was Rüdesheimer coffee using the Asbach brandy produced here.

CLARE CASTLE COUNTRY PARK OCTOBER NEWSLETTER

One of the Park's nearest neighbours is Clare Priory which lies through an old oak door tucked away across the railway bridge from the car park. The Priory is a jewel in the crown of Clare's heritage, with its history inextricably linked with that of Clare Castle over many centuries.

In 1248 Richard de Clare, Earl of Hertford and Gloucester, and owner of Clare Castle, invited the Augustinian Order to establish their mother house in England on land adjoining the Castle. The de Clares continued to support the Order, with Elizabeth de Burgh (nee de Clare) financing the building of the priory church in the 1330s. With the family's close ties to royalty, Clare Priory became the final resting place of eminent family members including Joan of Acre, Elizabeth's mother and daughter of Edward I; and Lionel of Antwerp, a son of Edward III.

In 1538 Henry VIII's men laid waste to the Priory. The church and cloisters became a ruin and the remaining buildings fell into private ownership. By the 1870s the Prior's House had become a school for boys, promising such luxuries as a weekly tepid bath "unless a special request is made to the contrary".

Despite offering all mod cons, Priory School closed and the house became a private home again, the sitting room featuring in Country Life in the 1920s. A spacious billiards room was added. At some point, stained glass salvaged from the church had been installed in the house. One such window contained the white rose of York. This is another reminder of the Priory's close links to Clare Castle, which was inhabited in the 1460s by Cecily of York, mother of Kings Edward IV and Richard III.

In early 1944, King George VI and other senior figures travelled by train to Sudbury and met General (later Field Marshall) Bernard Montgomery who was staying at Clare Priory. At the time the visit was shrouded in secrecy and even now little is known about it. A corridor in the Priory displays a copy of a letter from Viscount Montgomery, confirming that he visited the Priory in February 1944, ".....before we went over to Normandy.....".


The Priory returned to the Augustinian Order in 1953, thanks to the generosity of the last owner's family, who allowed the Order to purchase it at a fraction of its value. Mass was celebrated at Clare Priory that year for the first time in 415 years. The sanctuary lamp was lit by the last owner's son, Tony de Fonblanque who played another important role in Clare's history when he gave the town a major part of the land that now forms Clare Castle Country Park.

Upon their return the Friars created a church in the ancient infirmary, by then a barn, and this became the local Roman Catholic Church. The sitting room which had featured in Country Life became a classroom for novices learning theology and philosophy. In time the classroom became an oratory, allowing the congregation to celebrate Mass in the relative warmth of the house, rather than the bitter cold of the church. The billiards room became a social club and the Friars welcomed visitors from Clare and the surrounding area, with a local paper of the day referring to them as the Bingo Brotherhood.

Clare Priory saw another change in its long and eventful history in 1998, when the derelict glasshouse and stables were replaced with en-suite facilities for people on retreat. This now forms a significant part of life at the Priory. With the growing congregation no longer fitting inside the church in the medieval infirmary, a new church was completed in 2013.

Today four priests and a lay member of the Order live at the Priory, providing spiritual guidance to their congregation and visitors. The house itself is closed to the public but the grounds, current and former churches, shrine and ruins of the original Norman church and cloisters are open to the public. Visitors will find a plaque in the church ruins placed by the Richard III Society, marking the final resting place of the King's ancestors. The Priory is a key site in the Clare Town Tours <u>www.claretourguides.co.uk</u> And next time you're in the Park, make time to go through the old oak gate: you will find something very special behind it.

CLARE COUNTRY PARK (Article delayed from October issue)

I make no apology for talking about the Park's railway heritage again this month, as it is a significant part of our offer, and an aspect of the Park that people calling at our Visitor Centre often want to talk about.

The doors and windows of the station buildings have just been repainted. We decided to go with a blue tone similar to the historic British Rail blue. Used throughout the country from the mid 1960s, dark blue had been the predominant colour for signage in the Eastern region from the early 1950s, with old photos of Clare station showing blue enamel signs in place.

Our new livery will complement signs we have recently been gifted by former railway engineering manager David Newton from Hundon, and the Mid Suffolk Light Railway Museum; and loaned by the East Anglian Railway Museum. These are a mix of early 1950s enamel British Railway signs and earlier London & North East Railway (LNER) signs. LNER operated the station at Clare before nationalisation, taking over from Great Eastern Railway which opened the line in 1865.

Once installed on the station buildings, the signs will help bring the site's railway heritage to life. We hope that visitors won't be confused by the eye catching three foot long "Gentlemen" sign which is being reinstated in its historically accurate position, since this is now the location of the Park Office!

We have just received listed building consent and so can proceed with the installation of the signs later this year. The buildings are listed Grade II because they are the only surviving set of approximately 30 'Great Eastern Railway 1865 type' stations built to a standard design. This type had architectural uniformity for all the station buildings, even extending to the joinery and brickwork. Our other claim to fame is that Clare station is believed to be the only one in the world built within the bailey of a castle, the Victorians taking a somewhat more relaxed approach to heritage than we do today!

The signal box was sadly lost to fire in the late 1960s, but the remaining buildings can be seen by visitors today. If you visit on a Friday, Saturday or Sunday our visitor centre in the former south platform waiting room will be open and is well worth a visit for its photos, railway memorabilia and film footage, as well as maps, leaflets and information about the Park and Clare.


Alongside the new signs we'll be installing a vintage bicycle promoting the monthly Clare market, courtesy of West Suffolk Council. It will be adjacent to the Old Goods Shed, a reminder of the many bicycles involved in distributing packages arriving by train at Clare.



CARAID "HUMAN INTEREST STORIES.

As well as CarAid providing its routine medical trip assistance service for Clare and district residents, from time to time other interesting opportunities to help people sometimes occur. Names and personal details have not been included, but the contents discussed and approved by the parties involved.

January to August 2022. CAREER ASSISTANCE FOR A YOUNG MAN.

A CarAid user asked if temporary assistance could be provided to take her son, a young man from Clare, to a gardening job in one of the outlying villages. Normally his father would take him, but unfortunately the father had received a leg injury that prevented him from driving for about six weeks. CarAid could not officially help because this was not classifiable as a medical trip for the son, but the request was raised informally with the CarAid volunteer drivers, and a number offered their support to get the young man to and from work. Having obtained this guaranteed transport to his work, the young man sadly subsequently lost his job through no fault of his own. Word of his predicament was passed around within CarAid and CLASP, and he was helped to find a number of gardening jobs in Clare. The number of jobs has increased considerably over the spring and summer, and has been facilitated by him recently passing his driving test, to provide him with transport flexibility to support his gardening career.

July 2022. A LONG DAY FOR A CARAID VOLUNTEER DRIVER.

An excellent example of the CarAid commitment, which demonstrates the length to which CarAid volunteer drivers may be asked to go to provide their services. A Clare resident was taken to Addenbrooke's for a 8.30am. appointment. This was a return journey of two hours for the driver. The driver agreed to return to Addenbrooke's to collect the patient at 3.00pm., but unfortunately the patient had to wait for the issue of medications, and was not discharged until just after 6.00pm. The driver waited, meaning that a further five hours had been used on this part of the service, ie. another two hours return trip driving plus three hours waiting at Addenbrooke's. This meant that this volunteer driver gave up seven hours of his day to provide our CarAid service, which remember is free to the user.

IN PRAISE OF CLASP'S CAR AID! Published in a recent addition of The Parish Pump

I have often seen CLASP featured in the Parish Pump but, as we live in Denston, I didn't think we'd qualify for being able to use Car Aid. How wrong I was. When an urgent optician's appointment was needed, that would mean no driving for some hours afterwards, I rang the organiser, John Webb (07724 698283), who told me not to worry as Denston is virtually en route from Clare to Bury St. Edmunds and he would be happy to help. Within an hour a volunteer driver had been found who could take us the following day, wait, and bring us home again amazing. I am really very grateful to CLASP. Why not become a volunteer driver yourself - after all the longer the list of volunteers the fewer trips each will need to make. romandroger vergine
