Join in with the community celebrations at the Community Orchard on May 6th, as the seasonal wheel turns to Beltane. Beltane (literally 'bright fire') is a festival of fire, and of blessing the crops, animals, and people, as well as a mark of the changing seasons. A smudging incense made from locally grown herbs will be shared with the community as part of the Beltane celebrations. This smudging incense symbolises the cleansing smoke of the fires, between which cattle were driven on their way back out to the summer grazing lands. Some of the herbs used in this smudge blend have traditionally been used to fumigate hospitals and to cleanse spaces - and there's no denying there's a fair few coughs and bugs about - so let the cleansing smoke waft around you as you let the worries of winter slip away. 

<u>Rector's Ramblings – May 2024</u> <u>(The Mary month of May)</u>

As the days lengthen and spring bursts forth in all its vibrancy, we in the Church turn our hearts towards the Virgin Mary, Blessed Mother of God. Throughout May, we remember her with particular fondness, a tradition that stretches back centuries within Christianity.

In our benefice 2 of our 6 churches are dedicated to St Mary the Virgin (in Cavendish and Poslingford), her namesake holds a special place. The very stones whisper her name, a constant reminder of her enduring presence in our lives. But why May? Why this specific month for Marian reflection?

There's no definitive answer, but perhaps it's nature's own cue. May unfolds with the freshness of new life, mirroring the purity associated with Mary. Flowers bloom in vibrant hues, the earth awakens from its winter slumber, and the promise of summer hangs heavy in the air. Mary, ever the vessel of God's grace, embodies this renewal.

Within the Anglican tradition, our veneration of Mary differs from some other branches of Christianity. We focus on her humanity alongside her divine calling. Mary was chosen by God, yes, but she was also a woman who grappled with uncertainty, fear, and the immense responsibility placed upon her.

The Gospel of Luke recounts the Annunciation, the pivotal moment when the Angel Gabriel appeared to Mary. Her response, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word," (Luke 1:38) speaks volumes. Here's a young woman, presented with a life-altering proposition, and yet her answer is one of complete submission and faith.

May, then, is a time to contemplate Mary's unwavering faith. Despite the extraordinary circumstances, she trusted in God's plan. In a world that often demands we take control, Mary's surrender to a higher purpose offers a powerful lesson.

But Mary wasn't passive. She pondered the mysteries she was entrusted with (Luke 2:19). She accompanied Jesus throughout his ministry, witnessing his teachings and miracles. At the foot of the cross, she endured the unimaginable pain of watching her son suffer and die (John 19:25).

Her unwavering faith and presence throughout Jesus' life is a testament to her strength. She wasn't simply a vessel; she was a loving mother, a pillar of support, and a witness to God's work.

So, how can we incorporate Marian reflection into our own lives this May?

- Scripture readings: Spend time meditating on the biblical passages that mention Mary. Reflect on her character and the role she played in salvation history.
- Hymns: Many beautiful hymns are dedicated to Mary. Singing these songs can be a wonderful way to connect with the tradition of Marian devotion.
- Quiet reflection: Take some time for quiet contemplation. Think about the qualities you admire in Mary and how they might inspire your own faith journey.
- Acts of service: Remember that Mary was a servant of God. This May, consider doing something kind for someone in need. Volunteer your time, donate to a worthy cause, or simply perform a random act of kindness.

May is a time to celebrate new beginnings, a time to marvel at God's creation, and a time to reflect on the life of the Blessed Virgin Mary. By following her example of faith, strength, and unwavering trust, we can deepen our own connection with the divine and embrace the hope that spring promises.



May this May be a time of blessed reflection for all of us.







Psychology's got it backwards!

So most of us think we already know quite a lot about thought and when I first came across this understanding that I now share, I admit I felt the same. I had studied psychology, hypnotherapy and neuroscience and believed I had ticked the box and learned a multitude of ways to 'think better in order to feel better'.

But much to my surprise I learned something very different. I learned that 'thought' and 'thinking' are two very different things. 'Thought' (with a capital T) is a universal, impersonal, creative life force coming to us, and 'thinking' which is what we personally do with the power of Thought as it passes through us. Take a moment to digest that sentence - this is significant!

Thought is the superpower we never knew we had providing a continuous flow of fresh ideas crossing our mind, rather like news ticker tape. Thought itself is an entirely impersonal, neutral tool before we misuse it by adding our layers of personal thinking onto it. But rather than something that comes 'at' us to be dealt with, worked on, managed and controlled, we can learn to utilise the power of Thought.

We use Thought to create our personal reality. Do you remember creating things with clay as a kid? Well I like to think of Thought as the clay of the universe our thinking is what we actually do with it to create the world for ourselves. We took the clay, made whatever we wanted, and at the end of the day squashed it back into a bag - ready to start fresh the next time. This is exactly how we can think of Thought - at any moment we have an infinite stream of fresh ideas and the potential for new thought and insight which impacts how we live our life.

So what's the goal here? Well we can't simply choose to 'not think', but we can learn to use the gift of Thought as a powerful tool to benefit us rather than using it against ourselves as a weapon. The best way we can do this is by observing how we are feeling. Feeling is like a temperature gauge for our thinking-it gives us coded information as to what we are thinking and allows us to discern what thoughts are helpful and which are not. If we feel off or out of sorts, we know we are revving up some thoughts that aren't helpful to us - and to recognise it is us that is doing that puts us back in the driving seat.

My favourite analogy for Thought is like a Yo Sushi! Conveyor belt. We are continually fed tempting new 'dishes' with Thought, we have no control over what feeds in, but, like the diner we can choose what dishes we take, and we can choose ones we like, and if we leave something on the belt, after a while it will be taken off never to be seen again, and that also happens with our Thoughts. If you don't like the Thought you're getting, ask for different ones and stop revving up the ones you have!

This months quote for reflection is from one of my teachers, Jack Pransky: "All we are is peace, love and wisdom with the power to create the illusion we are not."

Until next month.... when we'll take a closer look at the truth behind stress.




Postcard to Hundon

As some of you know, I've been coming here for about nine years now, getting to know the friendly locals and the crazy, super-energised kids! In fact, some of you may have bought some of their artwork, which was exhibited at the village hall last year.

Every time I visit it's an adventure, and this time was no different. This visit was all about painting on walls - a small group of volunteers and some of the children from the camp got together to paint a jungle mural on the walls of a small area which is slowly being transformed into a garden, so that the children - who, living in the cramped conditions of the camp have little contact with nature - can experience the simple joys of growing plants in soil. It's a wonderful project, and we've all had so much fun painting the once-lifeless walls.

Broxted Solar Community Fund



This is the 10th Anniversary of the Broxted Solar Community Fund (BSCF).

It was established in 2014 by Broxted Solar Limited which operates the Solar Farm located within the Broxted Estate. The Broxted Estate – which is owned by Navigator Land LLP (the Ryder Family) – encompasses all of the Airfield of the old RAF Stradishall. As part of its 'Integrated Strategy' for Broxted, Navigator felt that Broxted was an ideal site for Solar.

Navigator consulted closely with Hundon Parish Council and the Community in establishing the Solar Farm. Following on from the Solar Farm 'energisation' in November 2013, Charles Ryder of Navigator, David Rowlinson – then Chair of the Parish Council - and Cubico (which owns Broxted Solar) worked together to create the BSCF. The objective of the BSCF is to make Annual Awards to Organisations and Groups seeking to provide, or to create, material benefit to the Community in and around Hundon. The Awards encompass both revenue and capital items and over the last 10 years some £98,000 has been granted to a wide range of Organisations and Groups, as illustrated by the Table of Awards set out opposite.

Cubico, which funds the BSCF, is a leading worldwide Renewables Group with headquarters in London. Similarly to Navigator, it places great emphasis on its environmental and social responsibilities. Therefore links to the local Community are of fundamental importance.

The BSCF will continue to make Annual Awards – currently set at £11,000 per annum – until at least 2038 and hopes that the Awards will continue to benefit the Community as widely as possible. Applications should either be sent in the form of a brief but succinct Note or by way of a brief Business Plan. Please note that all Applications must be for projects which require £1,000 or more. Sadly, not all Applications will be successful but such projects can apply in the following year.

The Community Fund Group looks forward to receiving Applications in the coming weeks. We very much hope that the Broxted Solar Community Fund will continue to be of great benefit to the Community of Hundon over the coming years.

Helping Hedgehogs


Here at Hundon Hedgehog Rescue we are trying, weather permitting, to get the 40 hedgehogs which came to us in the autumn, as too small to survive the winter, back to the wild. We also have new ones coming in with various problems that we need to treat. Many of these problems are the result of us humans not thinking about wildlife whilst gardening. So a few suggestions of how you can help wildlife.

- Avoid using pesticides particularly slug pellets. It can take a hedgehog a week or more in agony to die from digesting slugs that have eaten pellets. And they love eating slugs so let them save you money!!
- Provide a shallow bowl of water in a sheltered location, which all wildlife will appreciate.
- When striming cut a foot above ground first so if a h'hog or other creature is sleeping there you will miss them. You can then see if anything is there and then strim at ground level. Strimmers mutilate animals and they often do not survive.
- Dispose of litter responsibly. We have had several h'hogs wearing can ring pulls, cable ties, plastic bags, etc.
- If you have a bonfire either resite it before lighting or if that's not possible check it carefully by lifting the base. One very lucky h'hog came to us in the autumn having walked out from a lit bonfire!!
- Keep drain holes covered. It took 4 firemen to get a h'hog out of a drain in Bury St Edmunds recently, then we took it in and it survived. Dug holes for posts, footings, etc. are also a hazard.
- Make sure ponds have an escape route. H'hogs are good swimmers but need a way out of any water.
- Compost piles make ideal sleeping accommodation and someone pushing a fork in hurts at best or kills.

Finally breeding season starts soon. If you find any babies (called hoglets) with no mum about give us a call as a matter of urgency. They cannot survive very long without mum or someone to care for them and need special food.

What to do in your garden this month

To encourage your daffodils and tulips to flower next year work in some Bonemeal. Bulbs don't respond to nitrogen, so potash and phosphate is what they like, which is what bonemeal is. Dig it in a bit, and let the rain do the rest. After they have flowered deadhead the fading flowers, as pictured



and leave the stems and leaves to die down. Leave for 6 weeks or until they have turned brown and pull out easily.

Tying them up or chopping them down might look neater but this will stop the goodness in the leaves getting down to feed the bulbs, resulting in no flowers the following year.

Daffodils like to be planted at least six inches down. a bit less for the shorter varieties. Planting deep helps them naturalise.

Over 400 Suffolk roads set for upgrade as largest ever surfacing project gets underway

Residents across Suffolk are set to benefit from 421 newly surfaced roads this year - almost doubling the number of roads completed last year, as Suffolk Highways' largest ever resurfacing programmes get underway.

With the start of the surface dressing programme beginning this week, 102 roads will be surface dressed, whilst a further 319 sites will benefit from a full machine resurfacing during the year.

Surface dressing is an efficient, sustainable and costeffective maintenance treatment that prolongs the life of a road surface – it restores skid resistance and seals the road surface from water, whilst removing potholes and improving level differences of the road.



The surface dressing project sits alongside the programmes for reactively repairing potholes and machine resurfacing roads, all complementing one another. During the past six months, Suffolk Highways has repaired over 9,000 potholes and resurfaced 41 roads, with a further 278 roads planned for resurfacing in this financial year.

New for this year, Suffolk Highways' supply chain partner, Hazell & Jefferies, has invested in new vehicles which allow the new surface to be laid in a safer and more efficient way. For example, the new vehicles eliminate the risk of hitting overhead cables or structures.

Councillor Paul West, Suffolk County Council's cabinet member for Ipswich, operational highways and flooding, said:

"We are investing an extra £10 million into or surfacing programmes this year and have been busy trialling new ways of repairing potholes quicker, whilst streamlining processes to ensure we can keep on top of a challenging period when it comes to the surge of potholes we see during winter.

"The surface dressing programme is one of a range of methods we use to maintain and future-proof our roads. Preventative treatments such as machine resurfacing and surface dressing help stop potholes forming in the first place.

"I am glad that extra money going to road maintenance this year is almost double what we have seen in recent years, it remains one of our top priorities as the local highway authority.

"We recognise there is some way to go, however we are committed to doing all we can within the parameters of funding and resource to maintain Suffolk's roads to the standards we all want to see."

Holly's School Report : Part 1 Samuel Ward Academy

Need help deciding which secondary school to study at? In part 1 of Holly's School Report, Holly shares what it's like to attend Samuel Ward Academy.

Academy in Haverhill. I am in Year 8 and have been coming here for just over a year and a half, and I feel that I have really settled in nicely. I thought that it might be difficult to move from such a small primary school in Hundon to a big secondary school in Haverhill, but it was a lot easier than I imagined.

Every day at 8 a.m., I get the bus at a driveway near the village hall. It then makes two other stops in Hundon and carries on to Kedington, then through into Haverhill. I get to school at around 8.20 with plenty of time to spare before what is called muster. Muster is when we line up in our form groups to register and to make sure that our phones are switched off and in our bags. Following that, we head up to our form rooms in our form groups. We have five lessons on our timetable for the day, and we have a 2-week timetable that we switch every week.

At Samuel Ward, we have a wide variety of lessons, including some that other schools don't have in the curriculum (woodwork, photography, film studies, sociology, business, to name a few), which makes every day a different experience from the next. Personally, I enjoy drama, geography, English, and food tech, but these are only some of the many enjoyable lessons that are taught here. At lunch time, we have many clubs available to go to. These include performing arts (one that I am a member of), anime, choir, and tech club (years 9 and upwards). There is also the offer of after-school clubs, some being the netball team, gym, and in year 8 you can apply to be a sports leader and do training on a Wednesday after school.

I know that many people worry about the amount of homework that is set in a secondary school, as I did too, but you do not need to worry, as in this school, Year 7 pupils are not set homework that is due the day after it is set. However, there is homework that is frequently due once a week. In science, we have a homework website called Tassomi, which is a weekly set of quizzes that are usually due on a Sunday.

At Samuel Ward, they have a range of different people to talk to if you are struggling or having any problems. Every year group has a head of year and an inclusion officer. There is also a school nurse that visits every Thursday who you can talk to, and she can give helpful advice.

These are just a few things that make Samuel Ward unique, and hopefully this helps when you're deciding which secondary school to go to. Next time, I will discuss life at Stour Valley Academy with the help of my cousin, who goes there.

SEEKING INFORMATION (HELP PLEASE!



Do you know anything about the history of Kingsley Cottage, aka Southleigh, in Valley Wash?



I live at Kingsley Cottage, Valley Wash, Hundon. I have been here two years. Above is a picture of the cottage taken in 1905. I believe the locals would know the cottage as Southleigh, not sure when its name changed, but I believe it dates back to 1640. A couple of local people have told me there is a bit of mystery surrounding the cottage.

This piece of crumpled up newspaper was pulled out of a bathroom wall in 2008. It is a page from the Daily Mirror dated 21 February 1963. Its relevance is that the house is rumoured to have been used by Stephen Ward, Mandy Rice Davies, and Christine Keeler, in what became the Profumo Affair. In March 1963, John Profumo, the secretary of State for War in Harold Macmillan's Conservative government stated to the House of Commons that there was 'no impropriety whatsoever' in his relationship with Christine Keeler. The rest is history.





Editor: The first picture seems to give the cottage the title of "Valley Apiaries", and an internet search brings up some postcards written to a Miss Elsie Whiting, and a Miss Mary Whiting, of Valley Apiaries, Hundon, Clare, Suffolk, dated 1907 and 1908.



This address also shows up in The British Bee Journal and Bee-Keepers' Advisor (1901). One such entry follows:

NATURAL SWARMS of my well-known strain 3A to 4 lbs., at 12s. 6d. each, larger, 15s., headed by 1897 Queens. Address, Whiting, Valley Apiaries, Hundon, Clare, Suffolk.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting was held on 17th April at 7.30pm in the Social Club.

Reports were received from organisations around the village including HATA, Hundon Village Hall, Hundon Football Club, Hundon Village Hall Committee Hundon Village Shop and Post Office, the Hundon Herald, Hundon Educational Foundation and from Cllr B Bennett from Suffolk County Council and the West Suffolk District Councillors.

The Chairman's report highlighted the success of the village Coronation Event and thanked those who volunteered and to those organisations which donated funds to the event.

Work completed over the year included completion of the War Memorial, installing new benches around the village, maintaining the hedges and verges, and continued consultation with Suffolk Highways around potholes, and concerns around flooding. Emergency Plan is in it's final stages of completion, with a working draft available to support in emergencies.

The Parish Council continue to support local organisations and have awarded grants to, Hundon Post Office, Cricket club, the church, and Hundon Music Festival. The music festival is planned for July this year, which is a fantastic village event, there will also be a D-Day Dance coming up. If any organisation required support, grant information is available via the Parish Council website.

The largest project of the year has been supporting the football club with the installation of the new football club changing rooms. Hundon football club have worked hard over the past few years raising funds for the changing room project and secured a grant from the Football Foundation to get the project off the ground. The Parish Council have supported in the final stages and together it is hoped this project will be finished in the summer and provide a welcomed addition to the sports facilities in Hundon.

Lastly the Parish Council would like to give a massive thanks to Bob and Gill Shepstone for their work in producing the Hundon Herald. They have now stepped down from the role and Gillie has taken the reigns as the editor of the Hundon Herald, and it continues to go from strength to strength.

The draft minutes will be available to read on the Parish Council website, but will not be adopted as a true record until April 2025.
