#### Curate's Chronicles - June Edition 'Camino Days, Spiritual Ways'

Sat in the Common Room of Westcott House, Cambridge, my dear friend, and fellow Curate Ed used to tell me tall stories about his epic Camino pilgrimage. It inspired a curiosity in me to explore whether such an adventure would be feasible for me, and, thanks to a Grant from the Diocese, there came the perfect opportunity for a short reconnaissance trip last month.









I arrived in the beautiful city of Santiago de Compostela in Spain. It's a pretty and compact city with many lovely squares and streets brim full of eateries and shops, and very easy to navigate. The sun was shining, and I was happy to just lose myself there for a while before heading to my hotel.

After unpacking and taking a short rest I headed out for the ten-minute stroll to the magnificent Cathedral Santiago de Compostela. I sat in the Praza do Obradoiro watching Pilgrims arrive, cheering each other's perseverance and delighting in their accomplishments against the magnificent backdrop of the Cathedral's epic scale and architecture framed wonderfully by a vivid blue sky. The Cathedral was also stunning inside; the Portico of Glory, the Crypt and the giant Botafumeiro were among the highlights for me.

The Camino de Santiago (the Way of St James) apparently came into being in the Middle Ages, and now literally hundreds of thousands of Pilgrims undertake a Camino each year. Each person has their own reasons why they do it, and many are happy to share why if you ask. Mainly I sensed it is retreat from 'normal life' that fosters real growth in spirituality. I was very glad to meet a few folks like me who had never really walked or hiked much before because the next day I was to begin walking '7km slices' of the route to Finisterre and Muxia, a journey to the 'end of the world'.

After a hearty breakfast I headed off with my guide toward Negreira detouring briefly at Ponte Maceira to see the lovely medieval bridge spanning the Tambre river passing more cruceiros (stone crosses) and horreos (grain stores) than you could shake a stick at, the Way being clearly marked by the bright yellow Camino shell signs.

Numerous other shell signs guided me on my slices along the route towards the Costa da Morte and the lighthouse at Finisterre (for thousands of years it was thought that, beyond it there was only a watery chasm populated by sea monsters!). My final slice was into Muxia to see the Sanctury of Virxe de Barca and the famous logan stones. Many people have written books on their Camino adventures and so one page feels nowhere near enough! However, if this tiny glimpse inspires you to undertake a pilgrimage of your own, even a local one here in the UK, then praise God! I know that my time there has inspired me to return and undertake a full Camino as soon as time allows and I am excited by the prospect of walking with God on the Way.

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Hundon Village Hall – Planning for the Future



Hundon Village Hall facilities are recognised by the Trustees and Management Team to be a vital asset for the local community. A key element of our strategy is to keep hire prices low enough to enable local residents, community groups and businesses to hire the hall on a regular basis at an affordable cost.

However, local group hire alone does not generate enough annual income to cover all expenses and provide reserves for future maintenance and improvements, especially given the economic situation and impending energy cost increases due to our current fixed rate deal ending. Use of the hall for weddings and other social functions by external hirers has reduced considerably over the last decade so total income is significantly lower.

To address this the Village Hall Committee have started four initiatives:

- 1. To increase the promotion of the hall as a venue within the village particularly by organising more events to demonstrate the value of the hall to the community but also to build awareness of the potential amongst organisations, business and individuals across a wider area via the new website and marketing.
- **2.** To install an improved solar panel and battery storage system to directly address the rising energy costs we have applied for a significant government grant for this and ringfenced some of our reserves.
- **3.** To research grants and donations for future improvements.
- **4.** To focus on upgrading the interior and exterior of the hall to attract more one-off bookings from outside of the village, such as parties, weddings and business events. To do this, the interior of the hall has recently been redecorated and the walls filled with attractive pictures of the village to create a 'welcome to Hundon' atmosphere for visitors. A display area is planned for local photographs, items of interest and other memorabilia.

For the outside, which needs some repairs and redecoration, the Trustees need to create a more impactful 'first impression' to new hirers so are considering a classic heritage colour (and possibly a timber porch feature in future) to improve the appearance further. Colour is obviously a matter of personal preference but the choice of colours to achieve this first impression are limited so the colour options the committee have shortlisted are black and a few shades of green.

The hall was originally built with 'featheredge boarding' style exterior – presumably to partly resemble a barn – so either of these colours will suit the image of a traditional Suffolk barn. This will reflect others around the village and many others across Suffolk – not least several popular wedding venues.

The Trustees are aware that it is unlikely the community will reach a unanimous decision, but we want to give the village a chance to voice their opinion between these colours. These will be displayed on the village hall notice board from 1st June to 15th June. Members of the community are encouraged to go and look at the options and vote on the one you prefer using the box in the shop.

The Committee will continue to monitor the success of these initiatives and consider others to ensure the future existence of the village hall is protected for the benefit of local communities.

These initiatives and general management of the various facilities and events takes considerable time and effort by the Trustees and Management Committee who are all volunteers and juggling work, village hall duties and personal lives. Support from other residents is always gratefully received and anyone with expertise in venue marketing and promotion will be especially valuable!

If you feel strongly about protecting the future of the village hall and facilities, please volunteer to join the Management Team to be part of the decision-making and help with some of the workload involved in keeping the hall a success.





So much for 'progress'.



#### A polite request to fellow residents

Unfortunately our verges are very much disappearing, and much of this is definitely down to traffic mounting the verges. When drivers are forced up onto verges near ditches, the verges are collapsing into ditches, so not only are the verges disappearing but so are our ditches, which presents a flooding issue.

Sometimes, the reason drivers are having to mount the verge is that other vehicles are parking on the road. If you have a driveway, please use it. If you are parking on the road, please ensure there is sufficient space for other vehicles to continue using the road without having to mount the verge.

Gardening by the Moon is certainly not a new concept, and no, you don't have to go mow your lawn at night or sow your seeds by the light of the moon, although night time is an excellent time to catch those pesky slugs as they set to munching!

It has been well documented that the gravitational pull is highest during the New and Full Moon phases, drawing moisture up from the ground. Sap rises during the waxing moon and falls towards the roots when it wanes. If we work in harmony with these natural flows, we will be working *with* Nature, not against it.

There are a few different methods of Gardening by the Moon. The most simplest (which we will look at in this brief introduction) follows the phases of the moon, so all we need do is look up to see what phase we're in, and take it from there.

#### So which phase for what thing?

The New Moon phase (from new moon to 2nd quarter) is an ideal time to sow plants which bear crops above the ground and have their seeds externally (such as herbs, leafy greens and brassicas).

The second quarter of the Waxing Moon is an ideal time to sow or transplant plants which have seeds inside their fruits (such as beans, tomatoes, peppers, and squashes).

The Full Moon phase (from full moon to the third quarter) is an ideal time to sow flowering bulbs, and vegetables which bear the crops below ground (such as potatoes, onions, and carrots).

During the Waning Moon phase, moisture and light levels are dropping, making the last quarter not an ideal planting phase. However, this is the perfect time for pruning, eliminating weeds, general garden tidying, or a time to enjoy a rest. It is also the time to mow your lawn, if you want to reduce the rate of growth – meaning less mowing work for you!

Fancy some Lushious Lunar Locks? We can use the moon phases to help us with our health and beauty regimes as well. Cut your hair between New and Full (Waxing phase) to encourage it to grow quicker and thicker, or cut your hair between Full and New (Waning phase) to encourage it to grow more slowly.

Who's up for a little moon-mow experiment? If you'd like your grass to grow slower, try mowing during the Waning phase (the last quarter, just before the New Moon). If you're looking to encourage your lawn to grow, try mowing during the Waxing phase. If you have the space, you could do the full experiment and section off strips of lawn into the moon phases, and mow accordingly, leaving a strip unmowed as your control strip perhaps. We'd love to hear from you if you decide to give this a go! The moon phases are included on page 2 of the Herald.

#### Psychology's got it backwards!

This month's topic is stress - which I'll define as 'feelings of emotional and physical tension' and is something we've all experienced in one way or another throughout our lives.

We naturally consider that if our circumstances are stressful then feeling stress is inevitable and our only option is to learn to manage it. Most people don't talk about stress as optional - it's just something to reduce or manage when you have it. Stress reducing techniques will probably temporarily relieve the stress you feel, but won't stop it building up again in future. So what is it that creates this build-up of stress?

We think we experience our circumstances, but it fact we always experience what our mind is doing at any moment in time, and as such stress must come from our own mind. Stress is rarely questioned and we live as if the stress makes sense. My clients explain the reason they are stressed is because they have a really stressful job, or they are moving home or they are getting a divorce and it is taken as fact that this will result in feeling stressed. But when we delve into it we find it is not as simple as that...

What if stress is not coming from your external circumstances? What if you could have a completely different experience from your mind in exactly the same circumstances? For example my clients tell me that their stress naturally starts to build up on a Sunday afternoon, or a Monday morning when they get in the car to travel to work - but why at that particular time? I ask them if they ever have those thoughts on a Saturday and they usually say something like 'Yes, but I tell myself I don't need to worry about that now' and the feelings dissolve. So on a Monday the only explanation is that their own thinking is creating stressful scenarios and rather than dismissing it as they would on a Saturday, now it's provoking feelings of stress. What if we could respond to our thinking on a Monday as if it were a Friday and just feel better and have a better day at work as a result?

This is a very different perspective from thinking that stress is something coming at us, that we have to deal with, live with, grin and bear until it passes. Instead this puts us in the driving seat - it's simply a different state of mind and response to your own thinking.


Contrary to popular belief our experience doesn't come from our environment - it is always coming from us. We can react to our own thinking by focussing on it, and revving thoughts up, imagining and 'catastrophising' different scenarios, or we can simply let it pass through, let it drop away and see it for what it really is. Simply understanding and observing this, without a list of things to do, opens up all sorts of fresh possibilities for ourselves.

This month's quote for reflection is from renowned scientist and theoretical physicist David Bohm: "Thought creates our world, and then says 'I didn't do it'."

Until next month.... when we'll take a new perspective on the subject of anxiety.

## What to do in your garden this month

A few years ago when I planted pea seeds somewhere between March to June I was very disappointed to find so many maggots in my peas so from then on I planted either mange tout or sugar snap peas so I could harvest them earlier and avoid the pea moth maggots.

Last year I found some pea seeds that I could plant in the autumn so planted them in November. They over-wintered very well and am pleased to say I have just had my first picking, 18th May, long before the pea moth lays their eggs in June and July.

I do a very similar thing with broad beans, this time to avoid the black fly. I planted autumn sown broad beans in November and they are growing very well and bean pods fattening nicely. I will be pinching out the tops to encourage the beans to grow on and hopefully avoid the sticky black fly infesting my plants.

Nasturtiums (*Tropaeolum*) are a pretty trap crop; they'll attract the black fly and pests away from your main crops while also attracting many beneficial insects to your patch, with the added bonus that they are also tasty and nutritious.

A bright and cheerful way to spice up your salads, the flowers and leaves are packed full of vitamins and minerals, including vitamins A, B, C, and K, calcium, iron, and manganese. The young, unripe seeds can be pickled like capers.

There's still time to sow some Nasturtiums for a late display this year; they'll remain blooming until the first frosts. They're not bothered by poor soil quality; in fact, the poorer the soil, the more flowers you'll get! They also help enrich the soil they grow in, recharging the soil with nitrogen, calcium, potassium, and more, as they decompose.

66 Hi! My name is Holly and this month I am going to be telling you about what it's like to go to secondary school at Stour Valley, with the help of a Stour Valley student. My cousin goes to Stour Valley and I interviewed him on what life is like going there.

I asked him "What do you do in the mornings when you get to school?" to which he replied, "In the morning when my bus gets to school, I have to wait outside the front of school for a bit because it gets to school early. Then we go inside and have form time where we register and read the bulletin. You can also talk to your form tutor if you need to during that

Next, I asked "What are your favourite lessons and why?" and he told me "I enjoy PE because of all the different sports we do and I have that lesson with my friends. I also like History because of my teacher who makes the lessons fun which makes it easier to learn!"

## 6th June 1944 D-Day

## Operation Overlord, The Invasion of Normandy, France.

It was the largest amphibious invasion in military history, involving land, air and sea forces of the Allied countries and entailed landing troops on 5 beaches: Sword, Gold and Juno for the British and Commonwealth forces and Omaha and Utah for the American forces.

In the early hours of the 6th of June glider borne troops of the Ox and Bucks Light Infantry had captured the bridges over the Orne river and canal in one of the greatest feats of flying of the war by landing 5 of the 6 gliders next to the canal in the dark, the bridge was taken in 15 minutes, sadly Lt Den Brotheridge was killed in this action. They held the bridges until relieved. The Canal bridge was named Pegasus Bridge after the winged horse badge on the soldiers uniform.

At 06.30 the main attack started with a massive Naval bombardment off the coastal defences along with bombing by Allied aircraft. There were around 5000 ships and landing craft and 11,000 aircraft were tasked to support the operation. The British and Canadian beaches Gold, Sword and Juno, and The American beach Utah were taken with relatively light casualties, but Omaha was a different matter, they had heavy losses of around 2000 due to heavy resistance by the Germans. By the end of the day all the beaches had been taken but it would take a week before they were fully secure. 156,00 men had landed, but at a heavy price, around 4000 had been killed and many more were wounded or missing. German casualties were thought to be as many as 9000 although this was an estimate.

By the end of the week the beaches had been secured. 1000 tons of supplies, 50,000 vehicles of all types, and around 320,000 troops had been landed. It was realised during the planning stages that taking a port in usable condition would be very difficult so they came up with the idea of building and taking one with them. They were made of



concrete hollow sections, sunk in the water to hide them from the Germans during manufacture, they were then re-floated and towed across the channel with tugs and assembled on the beach head, one for the British beaches and one for the Americans. This made offloading supplies much easier, they were named Mulberry Harbour A and B. Each harbour consisted of six miles of flexible steel roadways.

There has been much written about D Day over the years, along with many films, so I do not intend to go into the general account of the operation. A good film to watch is The Longest Day made in 1962 with many of the top actors of the day, it is in black and white and covers all the main actions of the British and American troops. Some of you no doubt have seen Band of Brothers which is an American film.

There were many aspects of the invasion which most people do not know about and I am going to deal with one which is of particular interest to me and that is The Royal Observer Corps. Who? you may ask. The Observer Corps was formed in 1925 for the purpose of tracking aircraft, all aircraft. They were a civilian service but worked for Fighter Command. They were given the 'Royal' title in 1941 for the work they did during the Battle of Britain.

So how does this fit in with the invasion? It was realised that with all the firepower on the ships of the invasion fleet and the general lack of skill in aircraft identification, there would be allied aircraft being shot down by our own side. It needed experts in aircraft recognition, and the ROC were the best in that field. A letter was sent to all male members of the Corps inviting them to apply for service aboard ships for "forthcoming" operations, and would require the greatest level of skill in aircraft recognition. Over 1300 applied, of these 1094 reported to the Royal Bath Hotel in Bournemouth. Some failed the medical, one because he had an artificial leg and was deemed unable to climb the ladders on the ships. Some failed the very tough trade tests (aircraft recognition) and a few withdrew. Many of those who failed were sent to posts on the south coast to replace men from the forward zone, including the chap with the artificial leg, who, coming from way up North, had seen little enemy action but was now in the thick of it; he loved it.

The rest, all 796 of them, were enrolled in the Royal Navy for 2 months to serve aboard **Defensively Armed Merchant** ships. Enrolment was necessary because civilians cannot serve on armed ships because they would not be covered by the Geneva Convention. With enrolment they received the rank of Petty Officer and £1 a day pay which was better than they got in the ROC. They were issued a Royal Navy armband to sew on their ROC uniform along with a Seaborn shoulder titles. They were given permission to wear these titles after their return to normal duties and some continued to wear it in the Post War years. There are accounts of a few Observers hitching rides on landing craft and landing on the beaches, the blue uniforms must have been a strange sight among all that khaki.

## 14 Group ROC, Operations Centre, The Guildhall, Bury St Edmunds.

14 Group covered most of Suffolk and the bottom end of Norfolk. 17 Men from Suffolk were among those who served on board ships both British and American, stationed off shore close to the landing beaches and shelled by the Germans. It seems fitting therefore to name these men due to the danger they faced during the time they were there. Robert Waller; John Robert Rolph; Geoffrey Herbert Watts; Ronald Frank Sampson; Christopher Honeywood; Ford Jenkins; John William Constable; Theo Daniel Harvey; Frederick Charles Smith; Jeffery Philip Earl; Carl Hildyard; Richard Joseph Blower; Hector James Webber; Alfred Alan Reader; Norman William Clements; Tuffs Cyril John; and Colin Barry Hensby. They all survived and went back to ROC duty after being discharged from the Royal Navy.

Sadly 2 Observers died when their ships were sunk by mines, they were J.B.B.Bancroft (MV Derry Cunihy) and W.J.Salter (MV Empire Broadsword). Several others were injured; one by a flying bomb. I do have the names of all 796 men who sailed on ships and more details of their service. They all gave excellent service and received high praise from the captains of the ships they served on, in fact one captain refused to let his Observers go.

No Defensively Armed Merchant Ship with the ROC on board shot at any Allied aircraft, sadly the same could not be said for both the Royal Navy and the U.S. Navy or the armed landing craft. Several Allied aircraft were shot down by these ships.

The Operations Centre is still in the Guildhall in Bury and is open monthly, dates are on their web site, and after this article. Myself, and some of my crew are there to explain the work of the ROC both during WW2 and into the Cold War era. The ROC were stood down in 1991. The Operations Centre is the last one of 40 such Centres across the country. There were ROC aircraft tracking Posts at Clare and at Wickhambrook both during the war and the underground nuclear monitoring Post during the Cold War.

I hope you found this article interesting, if you would like any more information on the ROC or Wartime Suffolk I can be contacted via the editor.

## New Haverhill recycling centre on target for summer opening

A new £2 million recycling centre is on target to open on Homefield Road in Haverhill in summer 2024.

It will replace the recycling centre at Chalkstone Way and is more than three times the size of the existing site.

The construction works are being completed by FCC Environment and its contractor DXI Regeneration Ltd, on behalf of Suffolk County Council. The facility will be operated by FCC Environment, which manages all of Suffolk's 11 recycling centres.

The new centre will feature:

A raised platform giving visitors an elevated position from which to safely dispose of waste - removing the need for steps

A one-way system and easy-to-use layout, allowing customers to access clearly marked recycling bays

No need to close the facility to replace full containers

Improved accessibility and increased capacity for recycling and donating items for reuse

Greater separation between public vehicles and larger vehicles

Queuing capacity within the site and better access from the public highway compared to the Chalkstone Way site.

Suffolk County Council's cabinet member for waste, Cllr Richard Smith MVO, recently visited the site with local county councillors.

#### **CIIr Smith said:**

"Excellent progress has been made on the replacement recycling centre at Homefield Road, and we are confident that it will be ready to open to the public in the summer.

"The new facility is much larger, safer and more accessible, and will be fit to serve Haverhill and the surrounding area for years to come."

## Simon Hale, FCC Environment Area Manager, said:

"It is great to see positive progress being made to this new site which will provide benefits to the local community helping residents to recycle ever more of our resources. We are looking forward to the site opening in due course."

The waste transfer station on Homefield Road will continue to operate on the same site alongside the new recycling centre.

The project sees FCC Environment and Suffolk County Council working as part of the Suffolk Waste Partnership with West Suffolk Council.

## Share your thoughts on the importance of nature in Suffolk

A new survey has been launched to find out which aspects of nature in Suffolk are most important to you.

Your responses will feed into Suffolk's Local Nature Recovery Strategy, a plan to help reverse the decline in nature across the county, and to connect and expand existing areas that are important for wildlife and the landscape.

Nationwide, wildlife species have declined by 19% since 1970 (State of Nature report)

One in six species in Great Britain are at risk of extinction (State of Nature report)

Up to 70% of Suffolk's 22,000 ponds are neglected or abandoned (Suffolk Wildlife Trust)

Norfolk and Suffolk have over three times less ancient woodland than the national average (Natural Capital Evidence Compendium for Norfolk and Suffolk)

To address this decline and to help nature recover, government has introduced legally-binding commitments. There are 48 of these Local Nature Recovery Strategies across the country, led in Suffolk by Suffolk County Council.

Together, they will form a national 'nature network', proposing actions such as the creation of wetlands, restoration of peatlands, planting of trees and hedgerows, and more sustainable management of existing woodlands and other habitats like grasslands.

Councillor Richard Rout, Suffolk County Council's Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Finance and Environment, said:

"In Suffolk we have a higher proportion of protected sites for nature than other places. But these spaces are largely in isolated pockets that need improving and linking together.

"Protecting and enhancing these sites will of course help nature to recover, but also have a positive impact on all of us too. For example, the creation of additional coastal habitats can assist communities in adapting to sea-level rise, safeguarding homes and businesses; new green spaces for recreation can improve our health and wellbeing; supporting farmers to manage their land for nature can bring new funding into the rural economy, generating employment and training opportunities."

"At Suffolk County Council we're revising our land management to be more nature friendly, supporting enhanced biodiversity across at least 30% of our estate by 2030, and in the last few years we have planted over 250,000 trees.

"We're working closely with Norfolk County Council, as many important wildlife areas are shared between both counties. I look forward to hearing how Suffolk residents engage with nature, and from landowners who want to offer practical proposals about what they'd like to see."

Members of the public are invited to share their favourite nature spots to visit, what access is like, which habitats and species should be protected, and so on. You don't have to be a wildlife expert, but your thoughts will help the work to reverse the decline of nature in Suffolk.

Farmers, landowners and land managers are also encouraged to submit practical, achievable proposals to support nature conservation, as well as sharing how land is currently managed and any challenges faced applying for government funding schemes.

All responses will help build a picture across Suffolk to help protect and enhance our environment.

## Suffolk figures show county remains one of safest places to live.

Suffolk is in the top four counties in England and Wales where people are least likely to be victims of crime, according to figures released by the Office of National Statistics (ONS).

The total recorded crime covering the 12 months to the end of December 2023 show that there were 60.9 crimes per 1000 people\*, a decrease of 11% compared to the previous 12 months.

From residential burglary, public order, robbery, theft from person, stalking and harassment, vehicle crime, sexual offences, knife crime and drug offences all saw drops in recorded crimes, compared to the previous 12-month period.

Based on the ONS figures, Suffolk Constabulary is ranked fourth for the lowest levels of recorded crime in the country.

The force did see rises in business related crime (up 25.9%) and shoplifting (14.8%) and a marginal rise in possession of weapons (up 0.2%).

The figures do exclude fraud.

## More Suffolk homes eligible for energy improvements

More Suffolk households can access free home improvements to make them warmer, healthier and cheaper to run, thanks to Warm Homes Suffolk.

Residents and landlords of eligible properties can apply for energy efficient measures such as insulation, solar panels or heat pumps.

Average funding of £18,000 is available for homeowners, and £12,000 for landlords and their tenants.

Warm Homes Suffolk is administered by Suffolk County Council, and delivered by East Suffolk Council, on behalf of all councils in Suffolk. It has been funding home energy efficiency improvements for two years, with funding from the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero.

To be eligible, both of these conditions must be met:

- Homes must have an EPC rating of D, or below
- Homes are not heated by mains gas

And then either of the following conditions:

- Households have a combined pre-tax income of under £36,000 (this was previously £31,000)
- Homes are in a certain postcode (Hundon is not in the postcode)

Once these conditions have been approved, an assessment of your home will identify which measures are best suited to your property. These will then be installed by trusted contractors, for free. Landlords and tenants are also eligible to apply, with qualifying rental properties getting up to two-thirds of costs, as an average grant of up to £12,000. Landlords must have fewer than five rental properties and their tenants must meet the eligibility criteria. Through the Suffolk Climate Emergency Plan, the

county's authorities have a collective ambition to be net zero by 2030, towards which Warm Homes Suffolk is contributing.
